## **Three Calls to Action**

#### 1. Make Elm Grove safer



A Traffic Regulation Order has been published to ban pavement parking in Elm Grove, Brighton. The ban should eliminate the vehicle manoeuvres onto and off the carriageway.

Every time someone drives onto or off the pavement they increase the risk of conflict with a person riding past on a bicycle. So there will be significant safety benefits for people who'd like to cycle

along this busy and steep road.

#### **City Council Elections**

It's Question Time for Cycling



Are you aware of local council elections coming up in May? It's your opportunity to support the candidates who you think can do the most to bring forward plans for safer cycling in the city! But how do you know who those are? What specific plans do each of the parties have?

We have organised a Hustings on Transport and Travel, together with Brighton Active Travel, Sustrans, Living Streets and Friends of the Earth. At the Hustings, there will be a representative from each of the parties - Conservatives, Greens, Labour and the Liberal Democrats. The first part of the event will be questions put to the representatives from the Chair, Abigail Dombey, but after those there will be questions from the audience.

It's vital that we hold our local parties to account for their actions (or lack of action!) in the past four

years. And also that we ask them how they plan to make the city easier and safer for cycling in the next four years. They need to hear from you - the voters - so we urge you to put this date in your diary and join us at the Brighthelm Centre, or on Zoom for a live-stream, on Thursday 30th March 7-9pm. Show them that this is a topic which matters to you at the ballot box!

## **Bricycles Local Elections Campaign**

We're calling on all political parties standing for Brighton & Hove's Full City Council elections on 4 May 2023 to sign up to Bricycles' 3 Pledges below. Brighton & Hove City Council has set a goal to become carbon neutral by 2030. To do this we need to reduce carbon emissions from transport.

Bricycles' 3 Pledges will ensure Brighton & Hove remains a vibrant city for years to come by lowering transport emissions, air pollution, traffic congestion and road collisions, as well as promoting people's health and wellbeing.

## Bricycles' 3 Pledges

- 1. Build well-designed, protected cycle lanes
  - Protected cycle lanes keep everyone safe by separating each mode of transport, protecting people cycling from people driving and pedestrians from people on bicycles
  - Well-designed cycle lanes ensure cycling is accessible for everyone, providing space for people with disabilities who ride adapted cycles
  - Cargo bicycles can easily get around the city, promoting sustainable deliveries
  - Providing people with safe cycling routes allows many more journeys to be made by bicycles, freeing up road space for those who need to make their journeys by car
- 2. Create safer junction crossings for people using bicycles
  - Junctions should be well-designed for bicycles to safely enter and exit cycle lanes
  - Safe bicycle crossings better connect our city's streets, creating a network of bicycle-friendly routes
  - Good junction design allows cycling to feel safe, convenient and accessible to all
- 3. Create neighbourhoods that prioritise walking and cycling
  - Some of the most vibrant areas of our city are pedestrianised and cycle friendly, with both residents and visitors able to enjoy the many shops, cafes and restaurants on offer
  - By reducing through-traffic, walking and cycling is made more appealing in residential neighbourhoods
  - Well designed neighbourhoods that promote walking and cycling reduce road collisions, improve air pollution and promote a healthier lifestyle

#### **Planning for a Better Future**

### On Tenterhooks

The Council's bid for funds from the Government's Active Travel Fund Tranche 4 (ATF4), which is managed by Active Travel England (ATE) had to be submitted last week. This is money that largely pays for safer and better cycle lanes so it is very important.

Instead of having several months to prepare a bid for three years of funding, every English Council was given less than four weeks and could bid for only one year's worth of money.

By the time you read this, the ATF4 bid will already have been submitted and ATE will be making its decision any day now. It will divvy up by the end of March. Next year ATE says councils will have several months to prepare bids for funding that would cover three years of projects. Council officers should then have the time to engage more fully with community groups like Bricycles.

## Mini Holland



In January, Bricycles attended an event at the King Alfred Centre where interested groups and individuals met with councillors, council officers and the design consultants to discuss the proposals for the Wish and Westbourne Mini-Hollandscheme.

The design is in it's infancy, but we can expect carfree areas, filtered roads to reduce rat-running, improved cycle parking facilities and general publicrealm improvements.

BHCC's proposal has already made it to the last 19 applications, nationally. Our input on how they would like the scheme to look will be part of the next proposal stage, to be submitted by the end of this month, at which point a handful of the 19 applications will be selected to proceed.

This would bring some exciting changes to this part of Hove, along with the two other projects that are already approved and funded.

Construction started last month on the first, the 'Kingsway to the Sea' linear park, which includes a pump track. The second is the A259 Kingsway cycle lane westward from Fourth Avenue to the lagoon, where construction is due to start shortly.

#### Changing Behaviour

The Council uses its Government-granted Capability Fund to change people's travel behaviour. Projects include the Better Pointsapp to reward people who travel carfree, subsidising small & medium businesses to use e-cargo bikes, School Streets, adult cycle training (which restarts next month) and a three month trial of e-bikes for council staff who commute.

Tell your friends, family, colleagues and local businesses about these projects. They could help them to cycle more, which, in turn, will help the city be much more cycle-friendly.

## Better Access to the Downs

Brighton & Hove City Council wants to improve access to the Downs for people to get there under their own steam - which includes us. It has contracted the Jacobs consultancy to study the feasibility of some ideas, paid for with a ring-fenced grant from National Highways.

We were invited to share our thoughts with a Council officer so we met at Old Boat Corner, where Ditchling Road crosses the A27 by-pass and Coldean Lane, a horrible junction for people on bicycles.



On the way there, we bumped into the cycling group of u3A Preston Park, on its weekly ride. They suggested the whole junction could be controlled by traffic lights or there could be a signal-controlled crossing at the central refuge.

Bricycles suggested lowering the speed limit to 30 mph for 200 metres on all the roads meeting at Old Boat Corner. We allied this to reducing the speed limit on the south section of Ditchling Road (from Woodbourne Avenue to Old Boat Corner) to 40 mph because of the high frequency of collisions, although this stretch falls outside the current study.

Going north towards the Beacon, the Council would like to put a hard surfaced shared use path to Upper Lodges and

beyond, outside the boundary of Stanmer Park. The surface would be in keeping with Stanmer as a heritage site.

Inside the park itself, one suggestion is that the bridleways will be surfaced with Fittleworth bound clay. It's been used before and withstands rain, boots, hooves and bicycle tyres for many years.

The Council officer also mentioned the junction where southern end of Coldean Lane meets the Lewes Road at the traffic lights. Currently it's a pig's ear for safe cycling so please let us know your ideas.

We will feed into the process again in two weeks when preliminary results of the study are presented. So do tell us what should be done to improve cycling to the Beacon and at the Coldean Lane/Lewes Road junction.

#### A23 Preston Road

Yesterday we met a Council officer to share our concerns about changes made to the plans for phase 1of the improvements to the A23 Preston Road, from Argyle Road to South Road. Our biggest worry is that the cycle lanes on both sides have

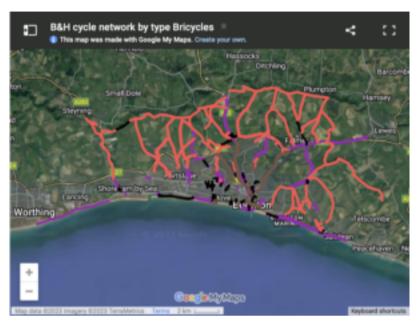


been narrowed from 2m to 1.5m. We'd also have concerns with the detail of the junction designs. It was good to be heard and to be told Bricycles will be involved the next review stage. Construction is expected to begin the end of this summer.

## Cycling Network Map Online



Have you seen the interactive map of cycling infrastructure across the city? Bricycles has mapped every bit of road, lane and path that has been modified in some way with the intention of helping cyclists. Some are great. Some aren't worth the paint that's been daubed on them. You can click to choose which kinds you want to see and we hope they'll help you to plot safe and easy routes across the city. The map also makes it utterly clear

how little cycling infrastructure there is for a city of 290,000 residents and the massive gaps in the network.

## Walking the talk

## New Bike Hub opening

Brighton's community cycle workshop is expanding. Brighton Bike Hub is a volunteer-run project, giving people access to affordable cycling. It has long had hub off the Lewes Road but is about to open its second (sorry, we can't say where until 12th March!). It provides: Free access to tools and workshop space for DIY repairs (donations appreciated), affordable new and used parts, advice and support from its volunteer team and a choice of second-hand bikes at bargain prices.

# **Budget Cuts**



Funds to create a Liveable Neighbourhood in Hanover & Tarner were withdrawn last week. Councillors met on Thursday to set the annual budget and voted not to spend £1.1 million on the project.

# Clean sweep



City Clean has been doing a great job removing graffiti from bike hangars - often cleaning it off within 48 hours of being alerted. When you see a hangar with graffiti, email the cycle hangars team, which will pass it on.

# **BtnBikeshare Scheme**

We're looking forward to the new BTNBikeShare scheme starting this Spring. Making journeys by bicycle will become easier for a lot of people and it'll boost the visibility of cycling across the city. The old scheme closed at the end of last year and the contract has been won by Beryl Bikes, which already runs schemes in many towns and cities. The new one here will have many more hubs than before and include, for the first time, e-bikes. We spotted some last month just along the coast in Portsmouth.



# **Proactive Safety Planning**

The City Council is changing the way that it decides to make changes for the sake of better road safety.

Until now, funding for tackling speeding, rat running, cycle safety or perceived collision blackspots has been limited to those areas where most collisions occur. It has been a reactive approach that sometimes starts only after the worst has happened.

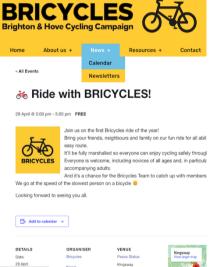
But now it's going to be proactive, giving council officers a better way of assessing and prioritising road safety improvements in the city.

This new framework will also take into account a range of other social factors, such as the perceived risk to pedestrians and cyclists, concerns about speeding or traffic volume, local walking and cycling priority areas, air quality and ways to encourage more active and sustainable travel.

### **Ride with Bricycles**
